

KEY THINGS TO REMEMBER ABOUT LASH EXTENSION ALLERGIES

- Patch test at least 3 days beforehand & do NOT do service if there is any reaction.
- Do NOT apply lash extensions even if there is just a minor allergy or reaction.
- Lash extensions placed too close to the skin can cause irritation to the client by irritating the opening of the lash follicle.
- Make sure the client's eyes are completely shut during application. The fumes from the lash glue are strong and can irritate the eyes.
- Go easy on the adhesive. If too much adhesive is used, it could cause a higher chance of a reaction or irritation. You only need a little glue per lash. The more adhesive used, the more fumes you create to irritate the client's eye.
- Always mist your client's lashes with water in the nano-mister to cure the glue and minimize reactions.
- Do not use cotton rounds or swabs near the application. Cotton, wool, or leather creates a heating reaction when it comes in contact with the adhesive.
- Make sure you hold the correct licensure and insurance for the state you are performing this service within.
- If you do lashes long enough, you WILL get a few clients who develop an allergy to the lash glue or the tape/undereye pads. It's not a matter of if, but when. So, it is important you thoroughly understand the information on this page and respond calmly and professionally.
- Keep a first-aid kit handy! This is the regulatory law in most states.
- Keep saline solution or eye-rinse water ready at your station in the event of needing to rinse the eyes.
- Always stay calm and never panic! Panicking can really freak-out your client.
- Continue learning and as things come-up call your lash trainer for advice.
